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Chapter 1 A WORD FROM THE CHAIR

# A WORD FROM THE CHAIR

Another year has passed, and we are again at this juncture where we report to our stakeholders and to the Filipino people the accomplishments of the National Historical Commission of the Philippines.

This year's accomplishment report highlights the Commission's Five-Year Plan 2022-2026, the framework that will guide the strategic directions of the NHCP for the next medium term. The First and Second Five Year Plans (2011-2021) focused on the modernization of NHCP-managed shrines and landmarks, major restoration projects, milestone commemorations of national heroes, and capacity building programs, among many other initiatives that strengthened Filipino nationalism through history. After its conclusion in 2021, it was necessary to conceptualize a new strategic plan that will be responsive with the needs and demands of the changing times.

Indeed, there came a need to reimagine organizational strategies as the Covid-19 pandemic disrupted the usual way we do things. For the last two years, the NHCP has reported how it withstood the challenges of the pandemic and how we successfully adapted to such. It is just as fitting and timely to adopt a new strategic plan at the height of the pandemic to provide us with creative schemes and approaches in fulfilling our mandates and executing our projects for the next five years.

The **NEW NORMAL Agenda**, as the strategic plan is called, is an acronym that represents the nine-point action plans that will direct NHCP in its projects, activities, and priorities for 2022-2026. It is aptly called as such, with "new normal" being a buzzword that pertains to the emergence of realities distinct from those prior to a crisis. The details of this Strategic Plan is laid out in the second chapter of this accomplishment report.

As we adopt with the needs, challenges, and expectations of the new normal, the Strategic Plan reinforces NHCP's foundation of being true to its mandate to promote, inculcate awareness, and foster appreciation of history. At the same time, it is forward-looking for its strategies related to information and communications technologies and anticipating the ever-changing



requirements of its clients and stakeholders. Thus, the Plan is a convergence of the past and the future.

Center to the Strategic Plan is the Commission's efforts to digitize our materials and collections, in support for the democratization, dissemination, and liberalization of access to historical and cultural information. One of its flagships is the National Memory Project, an online portal that will showcase high-resolution digitized materials on Philippine national and local history. Through this platform, the general public could easily access rare collection, unique items, and public domain materials found in NHCP library, archives, or museums. This 2022, the National Memory Project has undergone website development while digitization efforts by NHCP's technical divisions were in full swing. By 2023, the website is expected to be launched and go live.

As part of our strategic thrust to develop NHCP's own physical assets, the year 2022 also saw the renovation of its home in T.M. Kalaw St., Ermita, Manila. The NHCP Central Office Building is expected to be partially completed by early 2023, to be followed by a second phase of refurbishing. The NHCP also rehabilitated ten of its own managed shrines and landmarks; and undertook efforts to create conservation management plans for the Emilio Aguinaldo Shrine and Baldomero Aguinaldo Shrine in Kawit, Cavite.

Beyond its own backyard, the Commission, along with other cultural agencies, took part in a rapid assessment and structural integrity inspection of various heritage sites and cultural properties affected by typhoon Odette in December 2021; and the northern Luzon earthquake in 27 July 2022.

Likewise, the NHCP finished the restoration of five heritage structures in Western Visayas and Bicol regions.

With the gradual reopening of the economy, our shrines, landmarks, and museums have welcomed 721,351 guests in 2022, a significant increase from 111,264 in 2021. In this regard, we have also begun implementing face-to-face public programs including lectures, workshops, special exhibits, and heritage appreciation activities—while still embracing the online delivery of historic education through webinars.

Relative to its strategic thrust to strengthen networking, linkages, and interinstitutional collaborations, 2022 also saw the adoption of the 2022-2027 National Action Plan for Local History and Heritage during the 9th General Assembly of the Local Historical Committees Network (LHCN) in Cebu. The said action plan commits its current 74 member-affiliates to professionalize local history and heritage practice in the Philippines and expand the role of LHCN in public history and heritage protection.

As part of its mandate for historical promotion, the NHCP also published four reprints and eight new titles, two of which are related to the recently concluded Quincentennial Commemorations in the Philippines. To promote historical scholarship, the Commission also awarded research grants to nine individuals, in research areas on the role of the localities, ethnicities, and indigenous peoples during the Philippine Revolution and Philippine-American War; Philippine history during the Martial Law Era; and unexplored topics in Philippine history.

Finally, for its commitment to good governance and housekeeping, the NHCP—for the second straight year—received an award as an Outstanding Accounting Office by the Commission on Audit and the Association of Government Accountants of the Philippines. And for the fifth straight year, the Commission has exhibited its adherence to quality management systems by earning an ISO 9001:2015 certification.

This accomplishment report showcases the first-year implementation of the Commission's **NEW NORMAL Agenda**—a product of the vision, aspirations, and dedication of the management, senior officials, and rankand-file employees. As I leave the NHCP chairmanship after six fruitful years, I am confident that my dear Commission, and its next leader, will be treading a clear direction—towards a destination where our history is dynamic and flourishing; and its lessons valued and appreciated.

Maximize human resource capability through continuous development and support toward wellness and safety.








#### **GOING DIGITAL AND VIRTUAL**

# NATIONAL MEMORY PROJECT

Since 2020, the National Historical Commission of the Philippines (NHCP) has allotted a budget for the continuous development of an online platform that can hold a great number of high-resolution digitized materials concerning Philippine national and local history. Named the National Memory Project, the endeavor envisions democratized Philippine history materials, especially the rare collection, unique items, and public domain materials found in the NHCP library, archives, or museums.

Below are the project's objectives:

- 1. **PLATFORM**: Develop a site that is intuitive, following the conventions and best practices of democratization of information here and abroad.
- ONE-STOP NHCP SITE: Unify the diverse platforms and collections of the NHCP into a single online platform via the National Memory Project.
- 3. **UPLOADING**: To make the NHCP holdings available online with a small watermark footer like the conventions of the National Library of the Philippines to its digitized items.
- 4. RESPECT FOR COPYRIGHT: Not all NHCP holdings are accessible to all, especially the copyrighted Philippine materials unless accessed in the NHCP Main Library in Manila. Thus, accessibility is not for all unless equipment belongs to NHCP-authorized personnel and/or part of the NHCP premises. To address the mobility concern, there is a need to develop NHCP Spaces in the NHCP Museums and other areas where the public can enjoy the contents of the National Memory Project on all levels. Otherwise specified, downloading and reproduction of copyrighted materials are restricted in these spaces.
- 5. **ENRICHING PHILIPPINE HISTORY**: Expose more Philippine history materials found in various repositories of the country by expanding the catalog of Philippine history materials through collaboration with



institutions and personalities with unique Philippine history collections.

 EXPAND: Equip participating collaborators with digitization, especially the government entities. Collaborators may bring the NHCP-provided scanners to other institutions in their respective localities for more digitization efforts.

#### FEATURES

The National Memory Project is designed to be *user-centric*, thus addressing the concerns of how learners, educators, researchers, and the public, in general, can access and enjoy the historical wealth of the NHCP and its collaborators. The following are the expected features:

- 1. A one-stop site of digitized Philippine history materials at www.nhcp. gov.ph/memory
- 2. General search bar capable of deep search per item uploaded
- 3. Initial 2-terabyte Cloud storage (upgradable)
- 4. Special features include
  - a. **JOURNAL OF PHILIPPINE LOCAL HISTORY AND HERITAGE.** The official biannual journal of the NHCP since 2014.
  - b. **PHILIPPINE HERALDRY REGISTRY.** Contains the government seals classified into Provinces, Municipalities, Cities, Agencies, State Universities and Colleges, GOCCs, and Military, as well as government decorations and military badges.
  - c. **PHILIPPINE LOCAL HISTORY INDEX.** Collates the titles of published and unpublished studies on local history, some of which are downloadable if available.

- d. NATIONAL REGISTRY OF HISTORIC SITES AND STRUCTURES. Encompasses the marked and declared sites, structures, events, institutions, and personalities of the NHCP since it began marking in 1934.
- e. **NHCP MUSEUMS COLLECTION.** Features artifacts and holdings found in 29 NHCP history museums.
- f. NHCP Publications
- g. NHCP Survey Files
- h. NHCP Photo Collection
- i. NHCP Special Collection
- j. NHCP Rare Books and Manuscripts Collection
- k. NHCP Technical Notes
- 5. Curated contents based on topics.
  - a. Rizaliana
  - b. Symbols
  - c. Women
  - d. Philippine Muslim History
  - e. Markers
  - f. Historic Sites and Structures
- 6. Collaborating institutions will have respective clusters to feature their contributed items.



Chapter 3 COMPLETED RESTORATION AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

#### **RESTORATION OF ST. ANNE PARISH**

Molo, Iloilo City, Iloilo



The church completed its restoration in November 2022. The main scope of work included the restoration of the facade walls, repair of the cracks at the belfry, repainting the roof and dome, installation of four angels at the cupola and a replica of the original wooden cross atop the dome.

The plaza development was completed in August 2022. The scope of work are the redevelopment of the plaza; the restoration of the belfry to its pre-war appearance with the installation of park fixtures such as plants, benches, gazebo and fountain.

#### **RESTORATION OF ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST PARISH CHURCH**

The NHCP's restoration included the belfry's stabilization and reversion to its pre-war appearance; installation of four statues of the four cardinal virtues at its corners, three mechanical clocks, carillon bells; the central bandstand of the plaza, rehabilitation of the Graciano Lopez-Jaena Monument, and the construction of a new monument in memory of Patrocinio Gamboa, Jaro's local hero.

#### **RESTORATION OF THE CUSTOMS HOUSE**

lloilo City, lloilo



Built in 1916, "Aduana de lloilo" was primarily designed in neoclassical style with its imposing central tower by American architect Ralph Harrington Doane. It underwent restoration by the NHCP in 2018 and 2022, with its ground floor adaptively reused as the Museum of Philippine Maritime History.

#### **REHABILITATION OF THE MUSEO NI JOSE RIZAL, DAPITAN**

Dapitan City, Zamboanga del Norte



Completed on 29 December 2022, the project repaired the damaged Nipa Huts, the roofing of the main museum building to prevent leaks, and the generator to ensure uninterrupted electricity in the shrine. The rehabilitation of outdoor fixtures, the pavement, and the *Mi Retiro* pond was also done.

A new backdrop made of seasoned and treated bamboo with steel framing at the Rizal monument, and waterproofing membrane for the two verandas were also done.
3	<b>MUSEO NI RAMON MAGSAYSAY</b> Castillejos, Zambales	Rehabilitation, carpentry works, and painting of the main museum and annex building, retrofitting of the second floor balcony, electrical works, and replacement of deteriorated ceiling.
4	<b>MUSEO EL DEPOSITO</b> San Juan City, Metro Manila	Provision of new electrical service entrance complete with MDP Panel board for outdoor use, heavy duty and durable electrical wires and devices with extra electrical wires and fixtures for emergency use. A 3HP submersible pump was also supplied as back up pump for the underground cistern.
5	<b>MUSEO NI JOSE B. LINGAD</b> Lubao, Pampanga	In preparation for the opening of the Museum on 16 December 2022, the exterior walls of the museum building made of both concrete and wooden materials undergone repair of deteriorated portions and repainting.
6	MUSEO NI JESSE ROBREDO Naga City, Camarines Sur	The maintenance work includes the replacement of wall tiles and lighting fixtures in the lobby area, repainting of exterior walls, and rehabilitation of the timber and stone cladding.
7	MUSEO NG REPUBLIKA 1899 Malolos City, Bulacan	Replacement of the existing polycarbonate roofing into tempered glass roofing with steel framing, including the dismantling works of damaged and deteriorated wooden components and skylights.

### **2022 RESEARCH GRANT**

The NHCP, through the Research, Publication and Heraldry Division (RPHD), opened the 2022 Research Grant for all individuals interested to conduct research about Philippine history. Eight (8) grants were awarded with the following categories: 4 grants on the role of the localities, ethnicities, and indigenous peoples (IPs) during the Philippine Revolution and the Philippine-American War, 2 grants on any area of Philippine history during the Martial Law era, and 2 grants on any new and unexplored topics on other areas of Philippine history. On 7 October 2022, the NHCP Board chose and approved the following proposals:
